Recreational Trails Program

The Recreational Trails Program (RTP) is a federal assistance program of the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), administered in Vermont by the Department of Forests, Parks & Recreation (FPR), providing funding for development and maintenance of recreational trail projects. Each fall, FPR solicits RTP grant applications for trail projects from municipalities and non-profit organizations. RTP grants typically range from \$5,000 to \$50,000. Grants

are awarded for well-planned trail projects that will develop, protect and maintain trails and trail systems to create linkages to communities, improve livability and user-ability, and are open and maintained for public recreational use. RTP supports a wide range of recreational trail activities, such as hiking, mountain biking, walking, running, paddling (water-based trail use), cross-country and back-country skiing, nature-based interpretive trail use, equestrian, snowmobiling, off-road motorcycling, all-terrain vehicular riding or other off-road motorized recreational uses.

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Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP)

The purpose of FLAP is to provide safe and adequate transportation access to and through Federal Lands for visitors, recreationists, and resource users. The FLAP supplements state and local resources for public roads, transit systems, and other transportation facilities, with an emphasis on high-use recreation sites and economic generators. Projects are selected by a Programming Decision Committee (PDC) established in each state. The PDCs request project applications through a call for projects.

Recreation Economy for Rural Communities

Recreation Economy for Rural Communities is a new planning assistance program (sponsored by EPA, the U.S. Forest Service, and the Northern Border Regional Commission) to help communities develop strategies and an action plan to revitalize their Main Streets through outdoor recreation. This is not a grant program. With this assistance, a planning team will help communities bring together local residents and other stakeholders to decide on strategies and an action plan to grow the local outdoor recreation economy. The planning assistance process will take place over a period of four to six months, with a focal point being a two-day, facilitated community workshop. Participants will work together to identify a vision, goals, and specific actions to realize the locally set goals. Eligible applicants include local governments, Indian tribes, and nonprofit institutions and organizations representing any community in the United States. Special consideration will be given to communities that are small towns; economically disadvantaged, such as those in Opportunity Zones; and/or in the Northern Border region of Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, and New York (all of Vermont is included in this region).

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Rural Development

Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program

This program provides affordable funding to develop essential community facilities in rural areas. An essential community facility is defined as a facility that provides an essential service to the local community for the orderly development of the community in a primarily rural area, and does not include private, commercial or business undertakings.

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Northern Border Regional Commission (NBRC)

Economic & Infrastructure Development Investment Program

Since its founding in 2008, the NBRC federal-state partnership has provided federal grants to employment generating projects that have helped reduce poverty, unemployment, and outmigration. This is primarily accomplished through the NBRC's Economic & Infrastructure Development Investment program. Depending on the level of economic and demographic distress in the applicant's county, NBRC-funded projects can be eligible for up to an 80% matching grant. Please note that the Northern Border region now encompasses all of Vermont.

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Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - Vermont Community Development Program

The Vermont Community Development Program (VCDP) assists communities on a competitive basis by providing federal CDBG financial and technical assistance to identify and address local needs in the areas of housing, economic development, public facilities (including senior centers and community centers), public services, and handicapped accessibility modifications. Any Vermont town, city (except Burlington, which administers its own program*), incorporated village chartered to function as a general purpose unit of local government, or a consortium of such entities, is eligible for funding. However, the majority of projects are a coordinated effort between the municipalities, community groups and local or state non-profit organizations or small businesses.
